




Impact report 2022




In 2022 we celebrated our biggest year of impact yet.

Continued generosity from individuals, organisations and Government support allowed Trees That Count to support outstanding planting projects spanning the length of Aotearoa. Collectively, these projects represent optimism and responsibility for the environment; reviving the lush tapestry of native trees and shrubs across Aotearoa New Zealand and engaging communities in their vision.

From culturally significant projects for Māori communities; small community reserve projects around the country; support to farmers on a quest to extend native bush blocks to increase biodiversity and water quality; to widely collaborative, landscape scale projects, we've been proud to support groups at the forefront of restoration.





2022 was also a special year for us as a charity as we reached the milestone of 1 million trees donated in April, a mighty effort from the thousands of individuals and businesses that support our work.

We were honoured to partner with the Department of Conservation to deliver a programme of work to honour the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and plant 100,000 native trees across 15 outstanding projects, engaging thousands of New Zealanders.






And we were thrilled to see our work, which is only enabled by the many funders and planters that we connect, rewarded with winning the Sustainable Business Network's Regenerating Nature award.






In 2022, we supported **294 projects** to plant **528,042 native trees**
